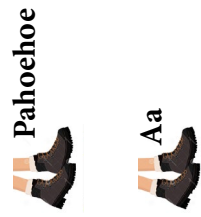

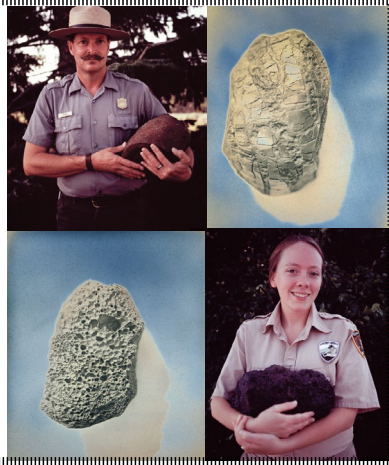


Landscape artwork has 3 main ingredients:

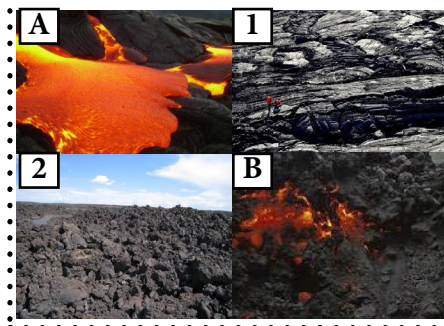
Draw Pahoehoe lava and Aa lava under the hiking boots. What kinds of lines describe the different kinds of lava?

One reason Craters of the Moon is a special place is because the landscape is covered with lava that cooled a long time ago. Two kinds of lava that are found at Craters of the Moon are called **Pahoehoe** (paw-hoey-hoey) and **Aa** (ah-ah).



Pahoehoe is a quick moving lava that flows like syrup.
Aa is a slow moving lava that is thick and chunky.
